EXERCISE A: Fill in the gaps in the sentences below to complete the information about the correct pronunciation of the ending ING.

- The present participle ending is written phonetically: /ɪŋ/. It is made up of 2 individual sounds.
 - The first sound is /ɪ/. In order to create this sound, we need a big smile on our face, so our cheeks are high, you can see our teeth and the tongue is very flat at the bottom of the mouth.
 - The second sound is /ŋ/. In order to create this sound, our jaw is relaxed and dropped. Our tongue is also very relaxed and flat at the bottom of the mouth.
