

## American and British English Word Stress

Some words are pronounced differently in American and British English variations. Although the meanings are exactly the same and, generally, these words are used in the same way, the stress within the word is in a different position.

## Other

There are also a few words in the English language where the American variation and the British variation have alternative pronunciation of words. Below is a list of some of these words and their stress in each variation.

Hos <b>pit</b> able	<b>Hos</b> pitable	(Adjective) To be welcoming
Marga <b>rine</b>	<b>Mar</b> garine	(Noun) A butter that is made. from animal fat/vegetable oil
Marsh <b>mal</b> low	<b>Marsh</b> mallow	(Noun) A sweet spongy food
Ob <b>lig</b> atory	<b>Ob</b> ligatory	(Adjective) Required by law or rules
<b>Op</b> portune	Oppor <b>tune</b>	(Adjective) Appropriate time
Ore <b>ga</b> no	O <b>re</b> gano	(Noun) A herb, commonly used on pizzas
<b>Pre</b> mature	Prema <b>ture</b>	(Adjective) Early
Res <b>pi</b> ratory	Respiratory	(Adjective) Relating to breathing
Week <b>end</b>	<b>Week</b> end	(Noun) Saturday and Sunday
