
Video: One-Syllable Words

EXERCISE F: Draw stress bubbles on the following words to show where the correct word stress is. Then write the rule that explains this in the space provided.






Rule: Three-syllable words ending in ER or LY stress the first syllable in the word. If the word is longer than three syllables, you stress the third from end syllable.
