EXERCISE A: Fill in the table below with the use of both the present perfect and present perfect continuous tenses. Example sentences have been provided. Fill in the gaps.


Present Perfect	Present Perfect Continuous
Duration of time for an event that started in the past and is unfinished	Duration of time E.g. I've been learning English for 10
E.g. We've been married for 10 years	years
Past events that impact the present situations	Impact on present
E.g. I've lost my wallet and I need it now	E.g. It's been raining all morning and my garden is flooded

Present Perfect	Present Perfect Continuous
Recent past events	Temporary situations
E.g. We've just arrived home	E.g. I've been watching the news a lot recently
