One of the key instruments you can hear in the background of this song is the marimba, an African percussion instrument made of wood. This instrument is a key feature in the song but was only added at the very last minute when the band were playing around with different instruments in the recording studio. It's believed that the striking sound of this instrument matched well with the rhythm of the song.

Mamma Mia has gone on to be the title of a film sequel and a theatre production in the biggest theatrical cities in the world, including London's West End and New York's Broadway.
