



You should know how to use cardinal numbers by now, but this is English, and there are always some irregularities and exceptions.



This presentation looks at two irregularities with cardinal numbers.





How would you say this number: 1300?

One thousand three hundred or thirteen hundred?





Actually, both of these options are correct.





1300

The classic cardinal number that follows all the rules is **one thousand, three hundred**.





1300

But many people in English use an alternative version. It is possible to say the first two numbers together (13-thirteen) and then the word "hundred".





1300

So this could also be as **thirteen hundred** as well.





Both options are correct and you can choose which one you want to use, but this is only possible for numbers that are 4 digits. The first two digits must be numbers (no 0's).

What are the two possible ways of saying each of these numbers?

1679

3400





- → One thousand, six hundred and seventy-nine
- → Sixteen hundred and seventy-nine





- → Three thousand, four hundred
- → Thirty-four hundred





- → One thousand, two hundred and five
- → Twelve hundred and five



Top Tips For Cardinal Numbers

The next thing to look at is numbers starting with 1.

For example, 1345.

Typically this number should be **one thousand**, **three hundred and forty-five**.

But it's possible to replace the number "one" with "a"instead.

We could also say a thousand, three hundred and forty-five.
