
Adverbs of Frequency

Adverbs of frequency tell us the number of times/regularity that an activity is completed.



Adverbs of frequency go in very specific positions in a sentence.

Adverbs of frequency that are one word (normally, usually etc..) go in between the subject and the verb

I <u>always</u> dance She <u>never</u> sings

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Adverbs of frequency that are longer than one word (every week, three times a year) go at the beginning or end of a sentence

I dance three times a year

Every week I go to the cinema



If the sentence has an auxiliary verb (such as a negative, or part of the tense) the adverb of frequency goes in between the auxiliary verb and the remaining verb

I will <u>always</u> dance

She doesn't normally sing



If the verb in the sentence is "to be", then the adverb of frequency always goes after this verb, in the affirmative and the negative

She is always happy
He isn't usually in the house
