Grammar Review

Compound Nouns

A compound noun is when two words are pushed together to create a new word. The meanings of the two words are also combined to create a new meaning. There are 9 types of compound nouns.

EXAMPLES

Ice + breaker → Icebreaker
Ice: frozen water
Breaker: a person who breaks things
Icebreaker: Boat that breaks ice/introduction

Part I	Part II	Example
Noun	Noun	Bedroom
Noun	Verb	Haircut
Noun	Preposition	Passer-by
Verb	Noun	Washing machine
Verb	Preposition	Lookout
Preposition	Noun	Bystander
Adjective	Verb	Dry-cleaning
Adjective	Noun	Greenhouse
Preposition	Verb	Input



NOTE

Compound nouns can be written in three different ways.

- 1) With a hyphen in between the two words e.g. *passer-by*
- 2) As one word with no space e.g. *bedroom*. This is normally the case when both parts of the compound noun are nouns.
- 3) As two separate words with a space in between e.g. *washing machine*. If this is the case, the second word must have a small letter and NOT a capital letter.

Compound nouns have a special pronunciation. All compound nouns are made up of two parts and we stress the first part in compound nouns.



EXCEPTIONS

EXAMPLES

Hairbrush
Lookout

When the compound noun is adjective + verb, then we stress the second part instead of the first part;

Dry-cleaning

Be aware that word stress can change the meaning of a word.

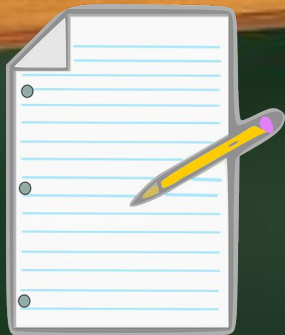
