





Asking questions is a vital part of a tour. Let's review the basic grammar structure for asking questions.



Most questions follow this structure...

Question Word

Auxiliary Verb

Subject

Main Verb

When was it built?



Question Word	Information	
Who?	Person	
What?	Object / Information	
Where?	Place	
When?	Time	
Why?	Reason	
Which?	Choice from a selection	
How often?	Frequency	
How	Manner	
How much? How many?	Quantity	

Question Word

First, choose your question word



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Auxiliary Verb

Second, use the auxiliary verb. This will depend on the tense or structure you are using.



Subject

Third is the subject



Main Verb

Finally, it's your main verb and this form will also depend on which tense or structure you are using.



Let's quickly review an example question in the 12 tenses.



Present Tenses

Present Simple	Present Continuous	Present Perfect	Present Perfect Continuous
Auxiliary verb: be or do	Auxiliary verb: be	Auxiliary verb: have	Auxiliary verb: have
Why do they look sad?	What are they building?	How long has it been here?	How long have we been waiting?



Past Tenses

Past Simple	Past Continuous	Past Perfect	Present Perfect Continuous
Auxiliary verb: be (was/were) do (did)	Auxiliary verb: be (was/were)	Auxiliary verb: have (had)	Auxiliary verb: have (had)
When was it found?	Why were they waving?	Who had lived here before then?	Who had been reigning before that?



Future Tenses

Future Simple	Future Continuous	Future Perfect	Present Perfect Continuous
Auxiliary verb: will	Auxiliary verb: will be	Auxiliary verb: will have	Auxiliary verb: will have been
Why will that happen?	What will they be doing?	How long will it have been?	How long will they have been building?



Typical questions

- When was it built/discovered/found?
- What is there to do around here?
- Where do you recommend to eat/drink?
- Where is the nearest toilet?
- When/why did this happen?
- Can you point it out again, please?
- Is this by Van Gogh?
