Present Participle

The present participle is used to form continuous tenses, as an adjective, in participial phrases, to convert a verb to a noun (gerund) and when the verb formation must change.

| Rule | Example |
|---|--------------------|
| Typical ending - add ING | drink > drinking |
| End of verb is consonant vowel, consonant - double the final consonant then add ING | swim > swimming |
| Final letter is E - eliminate E, add ING | drive > driving |
| Final letters are EE - add ING | see > seeing |
| Final lettters are IE - eliminate IE, add YING | die > dying |
| Final letter is C - add KING | picnic >picnicking |
