Adjectives and Adverbs

Adjectives are describing words. They add more information to a noun.

I like dark chocolate.



Adjectives and Adverbs

They are placed immediately before the noun or immediately after a linking verb.



Adjective + noun

I like **dark** chocolate

Linking verb + adjective

The chocolate is **dark**

Adjectives and Adverbs

Adjectives have different characteristics

Adjectives and Adverbs

An adverb is a word that typically **modifies a verb**, it describes the way an action happens in an English sentence. Sometimes it modifies an adjective or another adverb.

Adjectives and Adverbs

There are many types of adverbs in English;

-  Adverbs of frequency
-  Adverbs of place
-  Adverbs of time
-  Adverbs of degree
-  Adverbs of manner

Adjectives and Adverbs

Each type of adverb follows different sentence position rules.

Adjectives are most commonly mixed up with adverbs of manner, so we'll focus on that in this course.

Adjectives and Adverbs

Adverbs of manner can be placed immediately after
an intransitive verb ...

intransitive verb + adverb

She sings beautifully

Adjectives and Adverbs

... after the object with a transitive verb

transitive verb + object + adverb

He stroked **the dog** gently

Adjectives and Adverbs

... or before the transitive verb.

transitive verb + object + adverb

He gently stroked the dog
