

Past Simple v Past Continuous Use



The past simple and the past continuous tenses are both used to talk about the past time.



Both tenses express a very similar time but there are a few differences. Let's review the uses of both tenses and discuss the differences.



The past simple tense can be represented like this on a timeline.






The past simple tense has six main uses.

Past Simple Use	Example Sentences
Single past event	I went to Mexico last summer
Series of past events	I woke up, got dressed, brushed my teeth, had breakfast
Duration in the past	I lived in Barcelona for 3 years
Repeated past event	I drove to work every day
Changed state	She was short as a child, but now she's tall
Stative verbs	I wanted a puppy



The past continuous tense can be represented like this on a timeline.





The past continuous tense has six uses.

Past Continuous Use	Example Sentences
Before/ after structure	It was 7pm and I was having dinner
2 simultaneous actions	I was cooking while he was watching TV
Long past action	It was raining all morning
Setting the scene	It was raining, the trees were blowing, the wind was howling
Change and growth	They were growing up so quickly
Verb "to wonder"	I was wondering if you'd like to go out with me?



But there are a few similarities in these uses, so we need to choose the tense carefully.



We use the past simple tense to talk about a finished action but the past continuous could represent an unfinished action.



Consider these two examples, what is the difference in meaning?

Past Simple	Past Continuous
When I arrived, he did his homework	When I arrived, he was doing his homework



Past Simple	Past Continuous
When I arrived, he did his homework	When I arrived, he was doing his homework


The past simple tense tells us that the second event happens after the first event.





Past Simple	Past Continuous
When I arrived, he did his homework	When I arrived, he was doing his homework

The past continuous tense tells us that the two events happened at the same time.





Both the past simple and the past continuous can be used to talk about the time an event happened.

Past Simple	Past Continuous
At 8am, I left the house	At 8am, I was leaving the house



Past Simple	Past Continuous
At 8am, I left the house	At 8am, I was leaving the house

We use the past simple to talk about a specific time the event happened.






Past Simple	Past Continuous
At 8am, I left the house	At 8am, I was leaving the house

We use the past continuous to talk about an approximate time the event happened.

leave house





Both the past simple and the past continuous can be used to talk about a change.

Past Simple	Past Continuous
They grew so quickly	They were growing so quickly



Past Simple	Past Continuous
They grew so quickly	They were growing so quickly


The past simple focuses on the end result and compares the past change to the present.





Past Simple	Past Continuous
They grew so quickly	They were growing so quickly

The past continuous focuses on comparing two past points together.





The final thing to be aware of is that stative verbs can only be used in the past simple tense.



We cannot say "I was needing a pen all morning chocolate" because need is a stative verb.

Instead, we must use the past simple tense "I needed a pen all morning".
