
Let's review some of the phrases from the grammar video...

There is a large amount of butter in the fridge

Now let's analyse the structure...

Now let's analyse the structure...





In both of these phrases the structure is

QUANTIFIER + NOUN



What happens if the word directly after the quantifier isn't a noun. What if it is an article or a possessive adjective?



For example;

There are some my strawberries in the fridge quantifier noun



Now we have a possessive adjective "my" directly after the quantifier

There are some my strawberries in the fridge quantifier noun



If there is

- a) an article (a, an, the)
- b) a possessive adjective (my, your, his, her, its, our, their)
- c) an object pronoun (me, you, him, her, it, us, them)
- d) a demonstrative (this, that, these, those) directly after the quantifier then we must insert OF after the quantifier.



So this sentence is incorrect!



There are some my strawberries in the






We must add OF

























But you must be careful because there are some quantifiers that use of as part of their structure. This doesn't apply to these quantifiers because we can't write of twice in the sentence!
