

Past Simple v Past Continuous Common Mistakes



Let's take a look at the typical mistakes that English learners make in the past simple and past continuous tenses.





We were driving to school every day

Habits and regular activities that no longer happen should use the past simple tense instead.





We drove to school every day





I was cooking when he was arriving

Many English learners mix up the tenses with "when" and "while". When uses the past simple and while uses the past continuous.



I was cooking when he arrived

I was cooking while he was arriving





I didn't swimming in the sea

English learners tend to mix up the auxiliary verbs in these sentences, especially in the negative forms.





I didn't swim in the sea
I wasn't swimming in the sea



She was cleaning while I was walking in

When two events happen in the past, it's essential to use the correct tenses to express the correct timeline.




Past Tense Use walking in

She was cleaning while I was walking in

NOW

cleaning



she was cleaning when I walked in







She cleaned while I was walking in



when she cleaned, I walked in
