

Want Somebody To Do Something

When person A needs person B to complete an activity, we use this structure;

Want + somebody + to + infinitive verb

- The verb "want" can be used in any tense, although it's rarely used in continuous forms.
- The "somebody" can be an object pronoun, the name of a person or a noun

Present Simple	I want you to clean your room.
Past Simple	We wanted him to help, but he didn't.
Future Simple	Tomorrow, I will want you to pick Sam up.
Present Perfect	I have wanted Tina to get the job for ages.

A common mistake in this structure is inserting the word "that".

- X I want that you clean your room.
- ✓ I want you to clean your room.

This is a very useful structure used in everyday English.
