

Using Just

Just is a useful word that can be both an adjective and an adverb. As an adjective, it means fair, moral, ethical. As an adverb, it could mean;

Use	Example
Very recently	I've just finished my homework. *British English with present perfect tense *American English with past simple tense
Exactly	That bed looks just right for the room!
Simply	The shop is just around the corner. *Often used "only just"
Really	The house is just wonderful!
Almost	The dress just fits!
Narrowly	Sales increased by just over 2%. *Often used "just under" or "just over"
Intensifier	I'm sorry, I just won't do it.

There are numerous phrases that use just too and in each phrase, the meaning of the word changes.

Just about	Just a minute	Just now
Just on	Just so	Just as + adj + as
Just like that	I'm just saying	Just my luck
lt's just as well	It's just one of those things	Might just as well
Just help yourselves!	It might just help	Didn't he just
Just get/got + adj
