


Questions Common Mistakes






Where you live?

Many learners forget to insert the auxiliary verb in the present simple (do/does) and past simple (did) tenses.





Where you live?

Where do you live?







You are coming tomorrow?

It's important to put all the words in the correct order in English questions. In direct tense questions, the auxiliary verb goes before the subject.





You are coming tomorrow?

Are you coming tomorrow?







Who are you talking?

Prepositions can still be used in questions and, in the case of phrasal verbs or dependent prepositions, still need to be part of the question - they go at the end.





Who are you talking?

Who are you talking to?







Can you tell me where is she?



Indirect questions follow a very specific structure. The subject and verb are not inverted.





Can you tell me where is she?



Can you tell me where she is?







Who did call you?



In some cases, question words become the subject. When this is the case, no auxiliary verb is needed. The main verb is used in the tense form.





Who did call you?



Who called you?







You are British, isn't it?

It's really important that your subject and verb match in a question tag.





You are British, isn't it?

You are British, aren't you?
