## Many sentences in English place two main verbs next to each other.



#### They continued working together

The first verb is conjugated according to the subject and tense.

The second verb changes according to the verb formation rules.



## The second main verb could use one of three verb forms.

Infinitive

To + Infinitive

Gerund (ING)



# Depending on the rest of the sentence and its grammatical function, we can choose the correct verb form.

Bare Infinitive	To + infinitive	Gerund (ING)
Modal verbs We should do yoga	<ul> <li>After an adjective</li> <li>I'd be happy to help</li> <li>After an object</li> <li>I asked him to help me</li> <li>With certain verbs</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>After a preposition</li> <li>I plan on going to town</li> <li>Becoming the subject</li> <li>Cycling is fun</li> <li>With certain verbs</li> </ul>
