



An adverb is a word that typically modifies a verb, adjective or another adverb. It provides more information in a sentence and answers a specific question.



There are many types of adverbs in English;

- Adverbs of frequency
- Adverbs of degree
- Adverbs of manner
- Adverbs of time
- Adverbs of place



# Adverbs of frequency

These adverbs answer the question "how often?".

They are usually positioned before the main verb, with a few exceptions.

Examples: always, sometimes, never, often



## Adverbs of manner

These adverbs answer the question "how?".

They are positioned after an intransitive verb or after the object with a transitive verb.

E.g. loudly, quietly, softly, annoyingly



## Adverbs of degree

These adverbs answer the question "to what extent?".

They are usually positioned before the adjective they're modifying with a few exceptions.

Examples: so, too, enough, very, extremely.
