intransitive

*transitive - inseparable

To have a good relationship

We don't get along.

Phrasal Verbs for Friends

to hang out (with)*

intransitive

*transitive - inseparable

To spend time

I never hang out with my sister.

Phrasal Verbs for Friends

to ask over

transitive - separable

To invite somebody to your house

Shall we ask Paul over later?

Phrasal Verbs for Friends

to chill out (with)*

intransitive

*transitive - inseparable

To relax

I need to chill out this afternoon

Phrasal Verbs for Friends

to meet up (with)*

intransitive

*transitive - inseparable

To be in the presence of somebody for an event

Shall we meet up for lunch this afternoon?

Phrasal Verbs for Friends

to catch up (with)*

intransitive

*transitive - inseparable

To talk to learn what somebody has been doing

I'll catch up with my brother later.

Phrasal Verbs for Friends

to drop in on

transitive - inseparable

To casually and spontaneously visit

We should drop in on mum!

Phrasal Verbs for Friends

to crash at

transitive - inseparable

Informal expression meaning to stay at somebody's house for the night

Can I crash at yours tonight?

Phrasal Verbs for Friends

to care about

transitive - inseparable

To feel concern and interest for somebody

I really care about my best friend

Phrasal Verbs for Friends

to rely on

transitive - inseparable

To need somebody for support

I rely on my husband for emotional support.

Phrasal Verbs for Friends

to turn to

transitive - inseparable

To approach and consult

I always turn to my best friend for advice.

Phrasal Verbs for Friends

to stand up for

transitive - inseparable

To support and defend

We stand up for each other.

Phrasal Verbs for Friends

to gang up on

transitive - inseparable

To create a group to oppose somebody

The bullies always gang up on me.

Phrasal Verbs for Friends

to fall out (with)*

intransitive

*transitive - inseparable

To have a disagreement and argument

I fell out with my mum last night.

Phrasal Verbs for Friends

to make up (with)*

intransitive

*transitive - inseparable

To make peace after a disagreement or argument

We try to make up as soon as we can.

Phrasal Verbs for Friends

to hit it off (with)*

intransitive

*transitive - inseparable

To be naturally well-suited and get along

We hit it off last night.

Phrasal Verbs for Friends

to strike up

transitive - inseparable

To start a conversation

I always strike up conversations with strangers.

Phrasal Verbs for Friends

to grow apart

intransitive

To become less friendly over time

I grew apart from my childhood friends.

Phrasal Verbs for Friends

to drift apart

intransitive

To become less friendly over time

I'm worried we'll drift apart when we move house.
