Past Perfect Continuous

There are three common mistakes that English learners make in the past perfect continuous tense. Let's review them, so you can avoid these mistakes!





We'd been knowing each other for a long time before she passed away.



We'd been knowing each other for a long time before she passed away.

Know is a stative verb. Stative verbs cannot be used in the past perfect continuous tense. Instead, they must use the past perfect tense.



We'd been knowing each other for a long time before she passed away.

We'd known each other for a long time before she passed away.





We'd been working together since 4 years.



We'd been working together since 4 years.

Since must be followed by a fixed time (date, year, month, event). If it can be counted, we require *for* instead.



We'd been working together since 4 years.

We'd been working together for 4 years.





She had swimming before she went to school.



She had swimming before she went to school.

We must use all auxiliary parts of the tense. Subject + had been + present participle.



She had swimming before she went to school.

She had been swimming before she went to school.
