

## If v Whether

If and whether are both subordinating conjunctions and can often be interchanged. They both introduce a conditioner uncertainty in meaning. However, there are a few rules that tell us when to use one or the other.

## **Use Both**

We can use if and whether in the following situations:

Reported speech

He asked if we could go to town.

He asked whether we could go to town.

• When we're not sure about something

I don't know if she's coming to the meeting. I don't know whether she's coming to the meeting.

In general, whether is used in more formal situations while if in more everyday situations.

## Use If

We can only use if in conditional sentences.

If I were you, I would apologise.

We will cancel the event if it rains.

If I had woken earlier today, I would have had time fo breakfast.

## **Use Whether**

• After prepositions

I'm not interested in whether you can come. It depends on whether she replies.

• Before to + infinitive

I can't decide whether to take my coat.

We're still thinking about whether to put in an offer.

• Phrase "or" / "or not" (two or more options)

I'd like to know whether to wait or stay.

Please confirm whether we got the bid or not.
