

"So" is most commonly used as an intensifier, as you now know but it also has some other definitions. Let's take a look!





AS A RESULT / THEREFORE

We can use "so" to express a result or a consequence. In this case it is normally immediately after a comma and is followed by a subject.

I will wear a jumper <u>so</u> I won't be cold My car is broken <u>so</u> I will be late today





We can use "so" to add some extra information to a sentence. It has the same meaning as "and". In this case, it is followed by a verb.

He is a nice person, <u>so</u> is she. I forgot my phone, <u>so</u> did my husband.





AS A FILLER

When you can't think of what you want to say, you often hear "so" "erm" "OK". **So** can be used as a filler. It is often heard at the beginning of a phrase by native English speakers.

<u>So</u>, let's learn about adverbs today! <u>So</u>, shall we go to the park?



SUCH AS

Such as is an expression that means "for example".

I like food <u>such as</u> chocolate, fruit and vegetables.



I HOPE SO!

hope so is an expression to say that you want something to be true.

Did you pass the exam? I don't know but I hope so!



THERE'S NO SUCH THING!

There's no such thing means that something doesn't exist.

Do you believe in ghosts? There's no such thing!



NOT AS SUCH

Not as such means "not exactly".

Is she your teacher?
Not as such. She's my girlfriend now!



AND SO ON

And so on means "etc..."

I like all types of music; classical music, pop music, rock music and so on.



IS THAT SO?

Is that so means "is that correct?" and shows disappointment at this news.

He already left for the flight to France.

Is that so?



OR SO

Or so means "approximately" and goes after the estimated number.

There were 15 or so people in the meeting.



SO-SO

So-So means that something is OK. This isn't used very often by native speakers.

This ice-cream is so-so.



SO AND SO

So and so means "a random person" or "somebody" and this is not important for the conversation.

Yeah, so and so said you would be here today.

SO?

So? is a strong expression to say that you don't care about something. This must be said with rising intonation.

He's not a very nice person.
