This sentence is incorrect! The imperative form is the same for all subjects in English, it doesn't change.

Do not/don't + infinitive



The correct sentence is...

Don't sit there!





Sit down you!



Sit down you!



This sentence is incorrect! The imperative form structure is simply the verb with no extra words. In this example, we don't need the subject YOU.

Sit down!

This sentence is incorrect! The imperative form is the infinitive verb, we <u>do not</u> conjugate it like the present simple tense.


