At Virtually Fluent, all our classes are online. Once a student has **signed up** for a class and **filled in** the registration form, they can participate. All our classes are **carried out** on Zoom and we **run through** a new topic in each class.

I spend all day teaching on my computer. In the morning, I **turn** the lights **on** in my office and **switch on** my computer. I **log in** to my computer and **set** all the documents **up** for my classes that day. Sometimes I need to **print out** some information too.

During the day I have classes online. Sometimes I **zoom in** and **zoom out** of documents and pictures for my students to see, I need to **scroll up** and **scroll down** too and **click on** lots of different links. I usually need to **plug** my laptop **in** to charge too. The most important thing is at the end of the day - I **back up** my computer!

When I finish work, I **switch** all my electronic devices **off**, I **log out** and **shut** my computer **down** and finally **turn off** the lights in the office. At the end of my working day, I like to relax and **listen to** music.

transitive - separable

to place something inside a socket

to back up

transitive - separable

to store and save a copy of something

transitive - inseparable
