I like dark chocolate.






Where are adjectives placed in an English sentence?



They are placed immediately before the noun or immediately after a linking verb.



Adjective + noun

Linking verb + adjective



The chocolate is dark

How many types of adverbs are there in English?



An adverb is a word that typically **modifies a verb**, it describes the way an action happens in an English sentence. Sometimes it modifies an adjective or another adverb.



There are many types of adverbs in English;

- Adverbs of frequency
- Adverbs of place
- Adverbs of time
- Adverbs of degree
- Adverbs of manner



Where are adverbs placed in an English sentence?



Each type of adverb follows different sentence position rules.

Adjectives are most commonly mixed up with adverbs of manner, so we'll focus on that in this course.



Adverbs of manner can be placed immediately after an intransitive verb ...

intransitive verb + adverb

She sings beautifully



... after the object with a transitive verb

transitive verb + object + adverb

He stroked the dog gently



... or before the transitive verb.

transitive verb + object + adverb

He gently stroked the dog



She plays the piano _____

good

well





She plays the piano well

Linking Verbs

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She looks ____

sad

sadly





She looks sad





LINKING VERB

She looks sad

What are we describing?
The woman (SHE)





She looks ___ at her dog

sad

sadly



She looks sadly at her dog

She looks <u>sadly</u> at her dog

SHE LOOKS Saaty at HEL GO

What are we describing? The action (LOOKS)



adjective + noun

She is a quick runner

She <u>runs quickly</u>





How are you?

I'm good I'm well




