I didn't walk	I wasn't walking
You didn't walk	You weren't walking
He didn't walk	He wasn't walking
She didn't walk	She wasn't walking
It didn't walk	It was walking
We didn't walk	We weren't walking
They didn't walk	They weren't walking






Past Simple Use	Example Sentences
Single past event	I went to Mexico last summer
Series of past events	I woke up, got dressed, brushed my teeth, had breakfast
Duration in the past	I lived in Barcelona for 3 years
Repeated past event	I drove to work every day
Changed state	She was short as a child, but now she's tall
Stative verbs	I wanted a puppy



Past Continuous





Past Continuous Use	Example Sentences
Before/ after structure	It was 7pm and I was having dinner
2 simultaneous actions	I was cooking while he was watching TV
Long past action	It was raining all morning
Setting the scene	It was raining, the trees were blowing, the wind was howling
Change and growth	They were growing up so quickly
Verb "to wonder"	I was wondering if you'd like to go out with me?



What is the difference in meaning?

Past Simple	Past Continuous
When I arrived, he did his homework	When I arrived, he was doing his homework



Past Simple	Past Continuous
When I arrived, he did his homework	When I arrived, he was doing his homework


The past simple tense tells us that the second event happens after the first event.





Past Simple	Past Continuous
When I arrived, he did his homework	When I arrived, he was doing his homework

The past continuous tense tells us that the two events happened at the same time.





What is the difference in meaning?

Past Simple	Past Continuous
At 8am, I left the house	At 8am, I was leaving the house



Past Simple	Past Continuous
At 8am, I left the house	At 8am, I was leaving the house

We use the past simple to talk about a specific time the event happened.






Past Simple	Past Continuous
At 8am, I left the house	At 8am, I was leaving the house

We use the past continuous to talk about an approximate time the event happened.

leave house





What is the difference in meaning?

Past Simple	Past Continuous
They grew so quickly	They were growing so quickly



Past Simple	Past Continuous
They grew so quickly	They were growing so quickly


The past simple focuses on the end result and compares the past change to the present.





Past Simple	Past Continuous
They grew so quickly	They were growing so quickly

The past continuous focuses on comparing two past points together.





We cannot say "I was needing a pen all morning chocolate" because need is a stative verb.

Instead, we must use the past simple tense "I needed a pen all morning".

Single past event I went to Mexico last summer *A specific finished time	Before/after structure It was 7pm and I was having dinner *An approximate time
Series of past events I woke up, got dressed, had breakfast *Each action is finished before the next one	2 actions I was cooking while he was watching TV *Two events could be happening at the same time
Past duration I lived in Barcelona for 3 years	Long past action It was raining all morning
Repeated past event I drove to work every day	Setting the scene It was raining, the trees were blowing, the wind was howling
Changed state She was short as a child, but now she's tall *Past event compared to present	Change and growth They were growing up so quickly *Two past events compared
Stative verbs I wanted a puppy	Verb "to wonder" I was wondering if you'd like a coffee?



Past Simple	Past Continuous
Ago Yesterday In Once Last Then This When	While As All From to Through For





We were driving to school every day.





We were driving to school every day

Habits and regular activities that no longer happen should use the past simple tense instead.





We drove to school every day





I was cooking when he was arriving





I was cooking when he was arriving

Many English learners mix up the tenses with "when" and "while". When uses the past simple and while uses the past continuous.



I was cooking when he arrived

I was cooking while he was arriving





I didn't swimming in the sea





I didn't swimming in the sea

English learners tend to mix up the auxiliary verbs in these sentences, especially in the negative forms.





I didn't swim in the sea
I wasn't swimming in the sea



She was cleaning while I was walking in







She was cleaning while I was walking in

When two events happen in the past, it's essential to use the correct tenses to express the correct timeline.





She was cleaning while I was walking in



she was cleaning when I walked in







She cleaned while I was walking in



when she cleaned, I walked in
