Recently talks about a time very close to the present. It can be at the beginning or end of the phrase.

Recently, she's been watching a new TV series.







Lately is a synonym for recently. It can be at the beginning or end of the phrase.

Lately, she's been watching a new TV series.








Since refers to a specific past time. It can be at the beginning or end of the phrase.

Since this morning, we've been reading.








For refers to a period of time/ a duration. It can be at the beginning or end of the phrase.

For 10 years, we've been living together.







Only is used to focus on the shortness of duration. It goes in between "have" and "been".

She's only been speaking French for a few years.





All is used to focus on the length of duration. It must be followed by a time period.

All day, they've been staring at me.







The whole is a synonym for "all". It must be followed by a time period.

The whole day he's been waiting for you.
