They haven't walked	They haven't been walking



Present Perfect Tense






The present perfect tense has six uses.

Present Simple Use	Example Sentences
Life experience (no time)	I have visited France before
Recent past events	We've just arrived home
Change in state	I have improved my English
Past events impact present	I've lost my wallet and I need it now
Unfinished duration of time	I haven't been to the cinema this year
Stative verbs	I have known her for a long time



Present Perfect Continuous Tense





The present perfect continuous has three main uses.

Present Perfect Continuous Use	Example Sentences
Unfinished duration	I've been learning English for 10 years
Past impacts present	It's been raining all morning and it's flooded my garden
Temporary situation	I've been watching the news a lot recently




What is the difference in meaning?


We assume the event has already finished when we use the present perfect tense.


The focus is on the end result (learnt English).





Present Perfect	Present Perfect Continuous
I've learnt English for 10 years	I've been learning English for 10 years


We assume the event has not yet finished and will continue into the future with the present perfect continuous tense.





Present Perfect	Present Perfect Continuous
I've learnt English for 10 years	I've been learning English for 10 years

The focus is on the time phrase, the duration of the event (10 years).





Here is an alternative example






What is the difference in meaning?

Present Perfect	Present Perfect Continuous
I've worked at ABC most of my life	I've been working at ABC recently



Present Perfect	Present Perfect Continuous
I've worked at ABC most of my life	I've been working at ABC recently

The present perfect is used to talk about a long-term event for a long period of time.





Present Perfect	Present Perfect Continuous
I've worked at ABC most of my life	I've been working at ABC <u>recently</u>

The present perfect continuous is used for a <u>temporary</u> <u>action</u> that is going to finish soon.





Here is an alternative example

Present Perfect	Present Perfect Continuous
We've lived at my mum's house for a while Started living with mum NOW	We've been living at my mum's house whilst they're renovating our house. NOW Started living with mum



What is the difference in meaning?

Present Perfect	Present Perfect Continuous
I've used the swimming pool a few times since we moved here	I've been using the swimming pool regularly since we moved here



Present Perfect	Present Perfect Continuous
I've used the swimming pool <u>a few times</u> since we moved here	I've been using the swimming pool regularly since we moved here

With the present perfect, we know the event doesn't happen regularly.





Present Perfect	Present Perfect Continuous
I've used the swimming pool a few times since we moved here	I've been using the swimming pool regularly since we moved here

With the present perfect, we know the event happens quite regularly.





Here is an alternative example with the same difference.

Present Perfect	Present Perfect Continuous
I've visited my grandma recently	I've been visiting my grandma recently
NOW	NOW

I have been knowing her for a long time



I <u>have known</u> her for a long time



Present Perfect	Present Perfect Continuous
Just Already Never Ever Recently So far Recently Lately Up to now Since For In the last few Before Yet Still	All How long Since For Recently Lately Only The whole


