ocean

An ocean is the biggest body of saltwater.



sea

A sea is slightly smaller than an ocean and typically enclosed by land. A sea is part of an ocean.



lake

Lakes are smaller than seas and are completely landlocked.



pond

Ponds are even smaller than lakes and tend to be freshwater and manmade.



river

A river is a natural flow of water that connects to a larger body of water (sea or lake).



stream

A stream is a type of river. It's also a natural flow of water but very narrow and is generally not found in valleys.



waterfall

A waterfall can be found in a river or stream when there is a large vertical drop.



canal

Canals are artificial waterways specifically made for passage of boats through land.



port

Ports are facilities where seas meet land. Ships can be moored here with goods taken on and off them.



bay

Bays are found where the land curves inwards so creates a body of water.



harbour

A harbour is a location on the coast where boats are moored. It is slightly inland and protected from the rough seas with walls, piers or jetties.



beach

Also called the coast or shore, the beach is a flat or small sloping part of land that meets low-level water. It typically has pebbles or sand.

What is an idiom?




An idiom is a phrase in a language that is figurative. Words take on a different meaning when used as part of a specific phrase.

Native speakers use idioms in everyday conversations.




